And Then They Invented Television



The high rollers at Camp Bastion were already putting up their England flags and dusting off their televisions ready for the big event, but when Sgt Wiggins was taking a breather outside the Geo Cell, he heard feint murmurs in the wind of two of his LCpls crying about the fact that they wouldn't be able to see anything of the glorious game (that's football to all you rugby boys) as television hadn't yet reached the outstations of Gereshk and Shawqat. Within minutes the phone rang and it was Capt Mayes on the line saying "don't worry I'm on the case". He had also heard the crying.

A quick call was made to Nick Collins, the unit welfare officer back in Hermitage, asking for two television sets to be purchased and sent to theatre to raise the morale of the boys. It was agreed that this was to happen and, with just a few button clicks, two 19 inch television sets had been purchased from the BFBS website.

The word quickly spread that the World Cup was coming to Gereshk and Shawqat and LCpls Allen and Aschauer set to work clearing prime space to set the TVs up and also selling front row tickets for the big matches.

Within two weeks of the purchase, the TVs arrived in Bastion and were promptly forwarded onto their final destinations.

All personnel from the GSG in Afghanistan would like to take this opportunity thank everyone from the REA Military Survey (Geographic) Branch for their kind donations and for making it possible for the guys to watch the World Cup during a tough and demanding operational tour.

News from the Civilian Front – January 2011

Staffing: DGC has had a confirmed cut to its manpower as a result of recent savings measures. The capped figure of 506 (including 13 military staff) at the beginning of FY 10/11 is now falling to 477 at the beginning of FY 11/12. Work is in hand to achieve through natural wastage, i.e. retirements, transfers out of DGC and resignations.

Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR): Following the SDSR announcement of a reduction of 25% in MOD's civilian staffing civilians by 25,000 over the next five years, plans for a Department-wide Voluntary Early Release Scheme (VERS) is to be launched in April 2011. DGC is still awaiting the precise outcome of SDSR in terms of possible cuts to staffing levels.

Pride Update: Programme to Rationalise and Integrate the DIS Estate (Pride) is continuing to schedule. A key milestone was marked on 28 September 2010 in the construction of the new Pathfinder Building at RAF Wyton with the formal 'Topping-Out' ceremony, hosted by the construction company responsible for the new building and presided over by the Chief of Defence Intelligence Air Marshall Chris Nickols. The focus for work now turns to the installation of the internal infrastructure. The building is expected to be handed over to the MOD by December 2011.

PRIDE (Defence Intelligence Security Centre (DISC)) which will determine the best option for the future home for the Royal School of Military Survey (RSMS) and the Defence School of Languages (DSL) is uncertain at the present time pending the full outcome of SDSR, it is hoped that the future direction will become clearer by March 2011.

Production – Support to Ops: DGC continues to produce a range a geospatial products in support to Ops, standard series topographic line maps, digital datasets such as ditch analysis, cross country movement and compound map products.

Production Systems Upgrade: Production Generation Upgrade (PGU) continues, all the new equipment has been delivered and installed with most of the new workflows delivered, a good proportion of which have been successfully tested with staff familiarity with the new software and system continues to increase.

Training

Foundation Degree Ceremony - Hermitage

Tuesday 30th November marked a notable occasion when 45 Royal Engineer Geographic Technicians were awarded Science Foundation Degrees in Applied Computing at a Graduation Ceremony at Denison Barracks in Hermitage. This Foundation Degree programme, accredited by Sheffield Hallam University and run by the Royal School of Military Survey has now been running for 7 years and is one of a number of such programmes in the British Army however the graduation ceremony is the only offsite event sanctioned by the University. This ceremony was the culmination of up to 5 years of hard work and study. To achieve this award, students are required to follow an initial nine-month course, three years experience in an operational unit, and a further nine months' study at the School.

The Foundation Degree is designed to integrate academic and work-based learning through collaboration between employers and the training deliverers. All this training is designed to give the Geographic Technicians the vital skills they need when they deploy on operations, the key to the success of the programme being the strong partnership between the Royal School of Military Survey and Sheffield Hallam University. 27 graduands attended the ceremony, a good turn out as 7 are currently on operations in Afghanistan and others posted abroad



In spite of the severe weather in the north most of those attending made the ceremony on time though some cut it fine, being robed up within minutes of the start of the ceremony. Professor Phillip Jones, the Vice Chancellor of Sheffield Hallam University, officiating with Air Marshal Christopher Nickols, the Chief of Defence Intelligence being the senior military VIP. The Engineer in Chief (Army) was represented by the former Hermitage Commander, Colonel John Kedar. Staff and students were suitably attired in academic dress making it an exceptionally colourful occasion. After presentation of degrees a number of prizes were awarded. Cpl Kellysue Leitch gave a vote of thanks on behalf of the graduates and prizewinners and following formal photographs all staff, graduates and families had the opportunity to meet together at a formal reception and buffet lunch, the former being kindly funded by the Royal Engineers' Association (Geographic Branch).

It was quite apparent that the graduates realised the importance of the event but as always it is probably the parents and family who were most impressed by their sons' and daughters' achievements. What is in no doubt is that the Foundation Degree, as well as being an excellent tool for delivery of geographic training, is a very considerable aid in the recruiting and retention processes. However the achievement of the foundation degree is just the start as in January next year 27 former students will be enrolled with Sheffield Hallam University to continue their studies leading to a Bachelor of Science degree albeit over an extended period of up to 5 years, recognising that much of their time will be spent on operations.

Exercise River Cruse Written by LCpl Culley

On the 15 July 2010, members of 13 Sqn were invited to Upnor for a trip out on Mk 3 raider boats with 36 Training Operations Boat Troop, based near 1 RSME. The route to be taken was from Upnor, along the Medway, up to and along the Thames just past Westminster.

After jumping on a minibus at 6 am we headed along the M4 to Upnor. After hitting a load of traffic on the M 25 we arrived a bit late but just in time to go straight into a briefing for the day events. This took about 30min and covered everything from the route in detail, weather and actions on in the event of emergencies. We were less than impressed with the weather report!

After the briefing we went off to get kitted up in our full body condoms (dry suits), helmets and goggles. Then we headed down to the boats; two safety boats and two Mk 3 raider boats. Everyone in a full body condom went in the Mk3's and the rest got a comfier seat in the bigger safety boats.

Soon we were heading down the Medway at a steady 6 knots... this was because of the speed restrictions. However, as soon as we had passed our marker the operators powered up to full throttle (32 to 36 knots) and it was a case of hold on tight. The river started to get very choppy and we had waves of approx 4 ft. As a result we ended up getting soaked but moral was at an all time high. This heightened further when we saw the boat in front come off a big wave and nosedive through the next wave. The boat then turned submarine for a few seconds, sub merging everyone in the boat and ripping Spr (Nick) King's goggles straight off his face.

After a while we made our way to the mouth of the Medway. This is where the continual bouncing off the waves started to wear thin because the seats didn't have the best cushioning. After smashing into a few more waves and creating our own tidal waves over the boat, one of

the Mk 3 operator's life jacket randomly inflated. This slowed us down while we waited for the safety boat to sort it out. As we headed to the Thames Estuary the operators pointed out a wreck three masts protruding from the water. These belong to the SS Richard Montgomery which, over laden with high explosives, sank there during WW2 after hitting the sand banks. We were informed that it contains enough explosive to destroy a small island and efforts to recover it were aborted as it was so unstable.



We continued and made it to the mouth of the Thames, where the waves died down, but was still a bit rough. We were able to travel faster than the safety boats and ended up so far ahead of them that when we looked back we could only see two little dots in the distance. So we had to head back towards them. When we got near to them they shouted out to us that we had to head back because a fuse had blown and they had lost all lights and power to the wiper blades. Moral dropped straight away because we all knew that we were missing out on the best bit of the journey, up the Thames

to Westminster. In addition we had to turn around and go back through the roughest part which had become even rougher than before. The waves were now between 4 and 8 ft. Everyone just wanted to have a break from the seats and the battering they were taking from the waves.

We got through it and back into the Medway without any more hick-ups and only a few tidal waves over the boat. When the water calmed down we got back up to full speed for a short distance taking us back to the Jetty. We then washed down and hung up the kit and, after a few farewells and thanks to the staff, headed off for a quick pub lunch. The day was a little let down due to the fact we didn't get on to the Thames but we all had a great laugh on the boats when the adrenalin was pumping and the operators made it an enjoyable experience.

OPERATIONS

The tempo of operations in Afghanistan has not abated, it remains challenging and continues to bring the best out of many of our young soldiers, which has resulted in the awarding of a Task Force Helmand Commander's commendation for one young LCpl and a Meritorious Mast, a US Marine Corps (USMC) award, being presented to another.

November 2010 saw a shift in the geospatial support to Operations at the regional command level. The re-allocation of the Area of Responsibility and resources to a newly established USMC led Regional Command South-West headquarters in Camp Leatherneck (Bastion) has been completed, with the SSgt post moving on to its second incumbent already.

Of significance is the unrivalled success of the DATAMAN system in both Lashkar Gah and Camp Bastion, providing a common interface for situational awareness via web services. The DATAMAN is also becoming the place of choice for other functional areas to store and serve their data, all made possible by our adaptable and innovative data managers.

Sporting Activities

As you would expect the unusually bad weather prior to Christmas had a hugely detrimental effect on sporting fixtures.

Football. Football within Hermitage Station has continued to go from strength to strength with popularity calling for the reintroduction of a B team. Both teams have begun the new season with some encouraging results in both the league and Cup.

Hockey. With only one fixture being contested due to the bad weather, the Survey Hockey Club only managed a 5-5 draw against an energetic Bovington.

Promotions

After a number of lean years on the promotion front, the tide has finally begun to turn with the recent selection of three WO2s; Dom Andrew, Andre Noel and Martin Brown, all making the grade on a competitive Corp Sergeant Majors board; WO2 Andy Murray being selected for WO1; and SSM Gordon Chaplin being selected for WO1 and the coveted RSM. Our non Geo contingent (Andy and Gordon) proving that the Corp does not forget the mainstream soldiers who find themselves fortunate enough to be serving within our Regiment.

I will sign off here and thanks to you all for your valued support to the current crop of Geo soldiers out in Afghanistan. I look forward to seeing you all here at Hermitage in the near future.

Treasurer's Input

Financial Results - 2010

The accounts show an excess of income over expenditure of around £470 (subject to audit) which is very close to the budget forecast of £420 which was predicted at the AGM. The overall accounts remain in a healthy state.

Donations

Two donations from the RE (Geo) fund were awarded in 2010, as follows:

- £358 in August and £381 in October. Both were for welfare for soldiers in Afghanistan and mainly consisted of audio visual items – see front page for the story.
- The RE (Geo) fund currently contains £1714.32 which is available at the disposal of the Commanding Officer and RSM, through the Welfare Officer.

Two donations were also made from the Branch Reserve, as follows:

- £500 in August for sponsorship of JAGO sports activities. It was mainly used to fund the annual dinner and prize giving ceremony for the unit.
- £250 in October to help meet the costs of the Graduation Ceremony at which degrees were conferred by the Vice Chancellor of Sheffield Hallam University.

Thus £1489 in total was donated in 2010. Members have continued to contribute generously to the RE (Geo) Fund. The committee continually seeks opportunities to support the unit from Branch funds.

Subscriptions And Debtors

Subscription income in 2010 was £2144. There is a gradual diminishing, which is to be expected in an ageing membership, but the committee sees no need to increase subscriptions for the foreseeable future, though this can't be ruled out forever. The debtor problem remains under control. Only one member failed to pay his subscription in 2010.


Wanted: An Event Organiser

This unit was set up early in World War 2 to train 'bright' young boys in basic 'map construction'. Initially housed in an hotel in Milford on Sea it moved to the Grand Marine Hotel at nearby Barton on Sea where it stayed until 1943 when the unit moved to the small stately home of Bryn Howell near Ruabon in north Wales. Its near neighbour was the Survey Training Centre then housed in Wynnstay Hall and where the young boys progressed to as they reached man service age.

Many of those young boys went on to achieve fine careers in Military Survey and many of the friendships formed as 16 year olds lasted the test of time as the surviving, now very 'mature' boys meet up once a year back in Bryn Howell. The reunions are well attended with up to 50 making the journey to north Wales.

Dennis Martin

Dennis died on the 18th of October and his funeral was held in the parish church of Marston Magna near Yeovil on the 29th of October. Dennis was OC 135 Field Survey Squadron RE(V) from 1976 until he retired from the TA in 1980. During that period the Squadron was re-roled as an HQ AFCENT unit and the annual camps took place during AFCENT exercises in either Brunnsom or deployed in Germany. Dennis was promoted to lieutenant colonel in 1978 and was awarded the MBE in the 1979 New Year's Honours List.

Pete died just before Christmas following an illness. His funeral was held on the 29th of December in Christchurch Priory Church where 52 years previously he had married his wife Diz. Mike Payne paraded the Branch Standard at the ceremony, which was well attended by friends from his service with Military Survey.

Pete served a full career as a photographic technician retiring with warrant rank.

SAPPERS TO THE RESCUE

Cpl. Keith Churchill and L/Cpl. Peter Bevis, both serving with 42 Survey Engineer Regiment, Royal Engineers, stationed at Zygi in Cyprus were largely responsible for saving the life of a Royal Air Force man's wife when she was dragged unconscious from the sea recently. The two N.C.O.s with the assistance of Sgt. Eric Knowles of the Royal Air Force Regiment applied artificial respiration, and the lady, after spending two days in hospital, is now safely reunited with her family. But for the speedy assistance of the N.C.O.s the woman would most probably have died.
